Reunifying, Strengthening Families

Sitting down with WestCare clinical supervisors Joe Green and Oriana Kilgore to discuss the family reunification program at WestCare Sheridan, we talked about how it has gone from a little to a lot in just a short time. Joe and Oriana spend every other Saturday with the clients and their families discussing issues such as what is family reunification, what is codependency, the treatment experience, and the disease concept. With sessions being approximately 2 hours long, there is little time to get off topic. Some sessions take just over 1 week while the entire cycle is more than 5 months. Dynamics of the group include joining with 23 families in the client visiting room; clients and families, including significant others, sons, daughters, grandmothers, moms, and even a pastor. The group starts off with simple topics like alcoholism is a disease and then they branch off into smaller groups to start letting families interact about each educational lesson and try to apply it to their lives.



When asked what some of the strengths of this group vere. Ioe said. "It's how we all share commonalities, no one is all

were, Joe said, "It's how we all share commonalities, no one is alone." For Oriana, "It is the clients that are the true strength, they are the opportunity for family to see first hand what they have been talking about on the phone."

In closing, Joe had some final comments on being part of this unique and rewarding program, and he shares that it is the holistic approach to *uplifting the human spirit:* "Not only do we lift the clients' spirits, we lift the families' spirits, too." Oriana shares that "it is a pleasure to be part of this, as it is unique – there is nothing like it at any other prison. It is taking treatment to the next step, and it is truly an honor to be part of this."

Joe and Oriana both agree that support from upper management is such a huge factor in letting the program succeed, and we have gotten so much support from our leaders in Stan Brooks, Kathy Gubbins, John Zidek, Larry Harvey and Dawn Ruzich.

It's Not Too Early to Plan for Retirement

As someone running headfirst into Medicare enrollment and (eventually) retirement, I am incredibly happy to be personally involved in the WestCare 401(k) plan. We are one of a very small and constantly dwindling number of companies that still offers a 401(k) plan. Even fewer companies offer any kind of a "match" option.

The WestCare retirement/401(k) plan is outstanding. *You are throwing away money if you do not participate!*

After a recent conversation with Al Guida, Jr., our Financial Planning professional (aguidajr@guidaagency.lvcoxmail.com), (702) 732-9226), I found some frightening statistics:

- 45.6% of WestCare employees eligible to participate in the plan are contributing *nothing* towards their retirement
- The average account balance across all of WestCare, and across all age groups is approximately \$5,000

For those in my age group, (old!) the average balance is higher, but not by much. For those in their-20s-40s, the average balance is scary! Senior Citizen status creeps up on you more quickly than you can imagine, everyone! If you don't contribute at least <u>something</u> early on, you will *never* catch up. Struggling in retirement is something none of us want to face!

You have a great option. You can contribute to the 401(k) plan-

even 1-2% of your pay - and the magic of time and compounding will help you build towards a comfortable retirement.

You will be hearing more about this very soon, as we are putting together a campaign to educate all WestCare employees about the *extraordinary* program WestCare offers. W cant believe this is happening to me,' is all that went through my head!" Ruben Delacruz, Behavioral Health Technician exclaimed. "Little scratches and bruises were the height of my first aid training before I started working here. But here I was, less than a week of receiving training from Michelle Carpinelli and I was helping a man from choking with the Heimlich maneuver. It was a proud moment for me knowing with the right training and right mind set anyone can save a life."

Ruben started with GCC in early February. He completed his CPR and First Aid course in mid-February and one week later was putting it into action. On February 21st, Ruben was serving a client lunch in the dining room and he had his walkie-talkie with him. He called a 'Code Blue' and his co-workers came right to his aid. Ruben had the client in his arms but he needed help to get him into position to do the Heimlich maneuver. Assisted by Lead Tech Michelle Carpinelli and RN Melissa Hadas, Ruben held him up and he proceeded to perform the maneuver.

"I am just like a proud Momma!" says Michelle. "Ruben has been a great trainee and he is a fast learner. He has never done healthcare work before. When it came time to put his skills to the test, he did everything right. If he was scared he did not show it at all! I will say it again, He did everything right!

WestCare E-mail

E-mail plays an important role in our day to day activities. Our e-mail systems help us communicate, allow us to share files, and help us to manage our time. As convenient and useful as our e-mail system is, it does have some limitations. We are constantly looking for new solutions, and fine tuning our existing solutions, so that we all have the tools that we need to be more efficient. Two of these solutions are WestCare Mail Archive, and the new service WestCare DropOff.

WestCare Mail Archive

With around 1000 employees using WestCare e-mail, you can imagine how much data we need to manage. In order to keep our e-mail servers in tip-top shape, we need to limit the amount of data they manage from day to day. To do this we remove items in



your mailbox that are older than 6 months. We're working on a solution that will let you keep more mail in your inbox, but there will always be a limit. Fortunately, we still have access to deleted mail items. Every item you've ever sent or received is contained in one location. – https://mailarchive.westcare.com WestCare employees can log in using their computer login or e-mail credentials. WestCare MailArchive contains a powerful search engine that will allow you to search your e-mail based upon keywords in the subject, body, or even within attachments. You can also specify dates, sent or received, senders, recipients, or attachments.

Introducing WestCare DropOff!

Our e-mail systems allow us to send messages up to 20 MB in size (or about 800 pages in a typical PDF). This is more than enough for most e-mail, but sometimes we need to send something larger. WestCare DropOff is our solution. WestCare DropOff is easy to use, while addressing our specific security requirements. With WestCare DropOff we can send files up to 10 times the size limit of typical e-mail, and WestCare DropOff can be accessed from anywhere in the world.

WestCare employees can use their computer login or e-mail credentials for access. Outside vendors and partners can use the service with an e-mail invite to pick up files or by visiting the site to drop off files. WestCare DropOff allows you to upload large files, and to specify the recipients of those files. The system then generates an e-mail with instructions to pick up the file.

April 7th is World Health Day

World Health Day is an annual event on April 7 to draw attention to particular priorities in global health.

In 1945 diplomats from a range of countries formed the United Nations. One of the organizations formed was the United Nations Economic and Social Council, which first met in 1946. During this meeting, there were calls for the establishment of an organization in the United Nations, which would be dedicated to health issues.

The new organization would carry on the work of the Office International d'Hygiène Publique (the International Office for Public Hygiene) and the health units of the League of Nations. These organizations were established in the early years of the 20th century, but were overburdened by the huge health consequences of the aftermath of World War I and were unable to function effectively when World War II started. It would also carry on the work of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration, which provided medical aid to millions of people in the aftermath of

the devastating military action in Europe during the last part of World War II.

The World Health Organization was founded on April 7, 1948. Since then, the organization has carried out a huge amount of valuable work, including the global eradication of smallpox and the implementation of a wide range of public health strategies. Now, 193 countries are members and the organization is still working to improve many aspects of health around the world.

At the First World Health Assembly in 1948, the delegates called for a World Health Day to mark the anniversary of the founding of the World Health Organization. This has been held on April 7 every year since 1950. The day is used to draw attention to particular priorities in global health.

The 2013 Theme for World Health Day

The theme for World Health Day this year will be 'Hypertension', also known as high blood pressure, which increases the risk of heart attacks, strokes and kidney failure. Did you know that one in three adults worldwide have hypertension?

The goal of the day is to raise awareness of hypertension and its risks and encourage healthy behaviors to prevent heart attacks, stokes, etc. Life expectancy has increased over the past century and we will soon have more older people across the world than children and young people. We therefore need to prepare our health and social systems for this ageing world. In 1948, there was a call for the creation of a "World Health Day" to mark the founding of the World

Health Organization. And since 1950, World Health Day has been celebrated annually on 7 April. Each year a theme is selected for World Health Day that highlights a priority area of concern for WHO.

Project Isa-ta members were grouped with mentors and were given quality time to engage in conversations that consisted of information about HIV/AIDS and STI's, advice about how to become successful in life and explore the outreach displays at the Guam Premier Outlets sponsored by one of our partners, the Guam Coalition Against Sexual Assault and Family Violence, who were simultaneously recognizing International Women's Day.

Mentoring helps forge relationships that encourage ongoing dialog, education and psychosocial support. We are thrilled with our events feedback, with 100% of girls and mentors reporting they would defiantly participate again and many looking forward to ongoing relationships. Project Isa-Ta members had been highly anticipating this event which proved to highlight this year's theme: "Share Knowledge. Take Action."

CARF stands for Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities. It is a non-profit independent accreditation service that reviews numerous health and human services in the U.S. and many foreign countries. It's not a fly-by-night organization. It's been around since 1966, and serves as a valuable validator of WestCare's wide menu of excellent behavioral health programs. Think of the Better Business Bureau. Harmless and benign, yet a trusted and respected 'Seal of Approval.'

It provides an independent evaluation for consumers. But beyond that, the reality in the not-for-profit world of social services is that CARF's approval of a program carries tremendous weight when funders select providers. And above all, because CARF reviews are so precise and detailed, its 'report cards' are invaluable in improving quality of care.

Does that help? Hope so. Don't fear CARF surveys when your program is in line for review. It's all good.

An Intervention Primer . . . and Refresher

Working with our clients requires a variety of knowledge, skills and attitudes. Our clients present with multiple issues that require our





assistance, guidance and support including crisis situations. As a result, our staff needs to be knowledgeable about how to effectively handle any crisis situations that arise. When working with our clients, being able to effectively deal with a crisis situation is one of the most basic and at times one of the most critical skills that bag.

is in our skill tool bag.

On Thursday 14th and Friday 15th of March, 2013 the Atlanta based staff of WestCare Georgia came together to be trained in Crisis Prevention Intervention by Mr. Eddie Birt, our local certified trainer from the Boggs program. The group was split into two; those who had never had CPI and those who needed the refresher course.

Each group was taken through the steps of understanding the signs to watch for that signal a crisis is beginning, how a crisis becomes more intense in nature and eventually burns itself out and how to process the situation with a client. Staff was also taught self-preservation techniques to utilize if a crisis becomes more physical than verbal in nature. We learned how to position ourselves in order to appear less intimidating, how to verbally de-escalate and how to get out of a dangerous situation. We were reminded of little things, that are really big things, such as how your office or counseling area is set up - do you have easy access to the door, is your back to the door, is your escape route blocked by your desk?

The training was beneficial and necessary. Our staff now has a heightened sense of awareness about crisis prevention and our role in keeping the situation under as much of our control as possible. De-escalation is the key.

Continuing education and refresher courses are important to maintaining the excellence of our WestCare employees.

EARTH DAY 2013

AmeriCorps Spotlight *Volunteer Mentors Join Forces with Courts*

WestCare-NV AmeriCorps United by Service Members have been actively participating in the specialty Veterans Treatment Courts in Clark County. One such court is the Henderson Municipal Veterans Treatment Court (Department 1), presided over by Judge Mark Stevens, a United States Marine Corps Veteran who served in Somalia.



The Henderson Veterans Treatment Court, a specialty court launched in June 2011, aims to help veterans who face issues – whether it be posttraumatic stress or addiction – after they return home from service. It enrolls veterans charged with certain misdemeanor crimes—such as drunken driving, petty larceny, and possessing drugs – and attempts to rehabilitate them through a team approach.

This team approach within specialty veterans courts follows the example set by Judge Robert Russell, presiding judge of the Buffalo Drug and Mental Health Courts, who, in 2008 created the nation's first Veterans Treatment Court in response to the growing number of veterans appearing on his dockets who were addicted to drugs or alcohol and suffering from mental illness. A key component to these Veteran Treatment Courts and vital to the probable success of veterans involved in the criminal justice system is the availability of Veteran Mentors.

In Henderson, Judge Stevens has a cadre of volunteer veteran mentors,

and WestCare-NV AmeriCorps Members have made themselves available to serve in that capacity. In addition, the NV team is collaborating with the 8th Judicial District and the Las Vegas Justice Courts, to provide such mentorship to Veterans who find themselves in those courts.

WestCare-AmeriCorps Members serving in the United By Service mission are ideal candidates to serve as such mentors in Veteran Treatment Courts throughout the country. The SAGE model that serves as one of the pillars of the United By Service mission complements the specialty courts' purpose and enables AmeriCorps Members to serve their target population of Veterans and Military Family Members. AmeriCorps Members endeavor to Support, Assist, Guide and Encourage (S.A.G.E.) all with whom they come into contact.

On March 7th, AmeriCorps team members attended a graduation ceremony in the Henderson Veterans Treatment Court. At that graduation ceremony, all enjoyed hearing from three World War II Veterans, who shared some of their amazing life experiences. Evie Hallas, 90, Billie D'Entremont, 93, and Richard Zimpfer, 90, were there to be honored for their service, but they provided inspiration and wisdom not only to the two graduates of the treatment court, but to all in the gallery.
