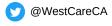

WestCare GulfCoast - Florida

Approaching its 34th year, **The Heron** is a state licensed assisted living facility in the Florida Keys that offers permanent housing and supportive services to Monroe County adults with chronic and persistent mental illness in a comfortable homelike setting. **The Guidance/Care Center (G/CC)** is in the process of redesigning and rebuilding this facility due to size limitations and safety code requirements.

Senior Vice President and Chief Development Officer for WestCare Foundation, Scott Faulkenberry, came down to meet with our Community Action Council (CAC) members individually and held an informative fundraising workshop as we embark on this \$6 million capital campaign. Scott highlighted the need for campaign volunteers as well as how to research and approach donors. All members agreed on the importance of such a critical program to our community as it is the only one of its kind serving the entire Florida Keys.

Here is a success story from one of our grateful residents:

"I woke up in jail not knowing how I got there. I'm bipolar and I was having a manic episode. Prior to jail, I was living in my red Pontiac Sunfire, a 'rubber tramp' as those that sleep in vehicles are often called. After jail, I was permitted to move into The Heron. Thank God! In school, I earned straight A's, I was captain of the No. 1 ranked University of Iowa Hawkeyes basketball team, and the Olympic festival team; and then it hit me on my 25th birthday. I stayed in bed until 4:30 p.m. - my first episode of depression. I'm now 56 and have suffered for 30 years with treatment-resistant, severe clinical suicidal depression and mania. At The Heron, I was finally prescribed the correct combination of medication. Hallelujah! This was an answer to many prayers especially from my parents, who have been married for 62 years, and my six siblings. I am no longer depressed or manic. The staff at The Heron work diligently to help me. They are incredible, professional, caring, and kind. The staff here cook all of our meals, book doctor's appointments, refill our prescriptions, and take us on fun outings - amongst other things. I absolutely love living at The Heron. I went from homeless to The Heron and feel so blessed."

Community Foundation Fund Created by Miki and Billy Davis Grants \$10,000 for Suicide Prevention

Turning a personal tragedy into an opportunity to help others, a long-time Keys family has worked with the Community Foundation of the Florida Keys to make its first grant from the Aaron Davis Broadaway Suicide Prevention Fund.

"The Guidance/Care Center is honored to receive a \$10,000 gift from the Aaron Davis Broadaway Suicide Prevention Fund, which will enhance our programming to prevent suicide and suicide attempts. The Guidance/Care Center is a proud provider of these services, and we are so grateful for this opportunity to save lives in our community as one more life lost is one too many," said Guidance/Care Center's Regional Vice President Maureen Dunleavy.

Billy Davis and Miki Yaras-Davis created the fund last year after their grandson died by suicide. Their wish is to make a difference and aid others, raise awareness for the alarming number of suicides that occur each year, and honor their grandson Aaron's memory. During his life, Aaron often spent time in the Keys visiting his grandparents and volunteering with his grandfather, Billy Davis, who Aaron called "Big Guy." They would assist numerous local nonprofits and serve others. According to Billy, "Many people knew Aaron and he was part of the fabric of this community."

The Davis' are hopeful that others who have gone through this tragic experience will donate to the fund so it can provide ongoing support to local nonprofits for suicide prevention programs and training and benefit those at risk, especially young people, in Monroe County. "Helping others is the best way to honor Aaron," Billy said.



Guidance/Care Center by WestCare



Every year, the Sioux City community in Iowa holds an outreach program called Siouxland Joining Community Forces that connects local service providers to the appropriate local resources. By sharing local resources, we can provide better, faster assistance to service members, military families, and Veterans when they need it. WestCare's staff in Sioux City are proud to be a part of this initiative to spread the word about the Supportive Service for Veteran Families (SSVF) grant that we can provide to better serve our unhoused Siouxland Veterans.

The event was held at the Sioux City Air National Guard Base for the Iowa Air National Guard's 185th Air Refueling Wing. The event is coordinated by the Soldier and Family Readiness Specialists in Sioux City and the Officer in Command of the Army National Guard's 1-113th CAV Unit, Lieutenant Colonel Robin Labios. The event is also supervised by the Director of Soldier and Family Services, Lieutenant Colonel Ryan Sextro.

The Family Alliance for Veterans of America (FAVA) staff were invited to give a presentation about our program, services, and events to a group of approximately 150 attendees including political figures and stakeholders. Staff were able to learn more about the other partner organizations and the lowa National Guard. For future reference, the staff will be provided with a spreadsheet of those in attendance along with their contact information to continue collaborating.

Some of the services in attendance at the event included employment, education, Veteran housing, mental health services, Veterans Affairs services, substance abuse services, and a representative for hospice. Some non-Veteran services in attendance were the Sioux City police, the local Boys and Girls Clubs, and the Center for Siouxland, which provides various services for financial counseling and support for those that qualify. The event was also attended by the staff of lowa's sitting U.S. Senators, Chuck Grassley and Joni Ernst, who ensure that our Veteran and service members are being heard at the federal level.

Our Sioux City WestCare staff have attended the event twice and will continue to attend to support our Veteran, service member, and military families to ensure they know that our program is there to help them and their family if they ever need our services.

From July 25 through July 30, Eastern Kentucky received approximately 16 inches of rainfall. This historic amount of precipitation came at the worst time during the late evening and early morning hours when most residents were asleep in their homes.

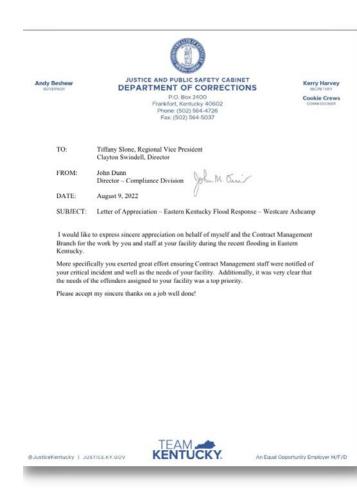
The rainfall quickly flooded creeks and rivers, rising into homes. Travel was almost impossible due to flooded roads and bridges that were swept away. Thousands were stranded and could only watch as their homes and possessions were lost to the rising waters. Some residents remained stranded for days. Others were rescued by emergency personnel and law enforcement. Forty Kentuckians lost their lives to the ravaging flood waters. Area businesses and schools were forced to shut down.

Kentucky's governor declared a state of emergency to allow help from the federal government and the National Guard. It would be days and in some cases weeks before roadways could be reopened. Many residents could only be reached by helicopter or boat. The loss of property reached millions of dollars.

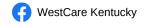
WestCare Kentucky's Ashcamp facility is located in the heart of the flood zone. Housed in this WestCare facility were 75 Kentucky Department of Corrections clients along with staff. On July 28, the morning of the initial flooding, WestCare staff members, Tiffany Slone, Steven Wright, Clayton Swindall, Doug Ramey, William Pugh, and Danny Stiltner evacuated the residents and moved them to a safe location. WestCare staff relocated the residents to a local church and arranged for meals and safe shelter.

The following day, with many roads still impassable, WestCare staff members, Tiffany Slone, Clayton Swindall, Tony Adkins, Shaun Doan, Matt Gross, William Pugh, Steven Wright, Doug Ramey, Danny Stiltner, Elsie Tiller, James Mullins, Dalton Anderson, and myself traveled to the facility to assess damage and began the clean-up process. Staff removed water, debris, and damaged flooring from the facility and began to restore essential services to the building. Thanks to the efforts of WestCare staff, the facility was cleaned, inspected, and approved for the return of residents within a day.

In response, the **Kentucky Department of Corrections** issued a letter of appreciation for the rapid actions taken to ensure the safety of the residents. On behalf of our team and those that we serve, thank you to all of our WestCare heroes for your assistance in keeping our clients and facility safe!

When we consider the benefit of positive social interaction, undoubtedly one of the most important aspects is improved mental health. Meeting and greeting also promotes a sense of safety, belonging, and security. There is also evidence that being social can help you live longer, so let's definitely hope and pray that events such as this will continue in the future and that both our alumni and the clients receiving treatment will continue to reap the benefits.

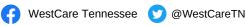
Raising Overdose Awareness in Tennessee

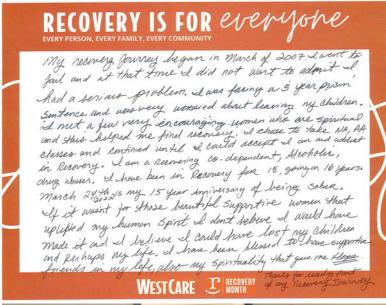

Information Technology



WestCare has begun to ship new computers with **Windows 11** installed. If you receive a new computer, you will probably get one with Windows 11 installed from the factory. Shipping Windows 11 helps to keep WestCare at the leading edge of technology, ensuring that we have secure and stable systems that allow our team to work efficiently and safely.

We will not be upgrading existing Windows 10 computers to Windows 11 at this time. There are some significant challenges to overcome on some of our older fleet. Windows 10 will continue to be supported alongside Windows 11.

The first thing you will notice with Windows 11 is the new startup sound. In fact, there are new system sounds for just about everything. It also looks a bit different. Windows now have rounded edges and mimic a glass look.

While the look is a bit different, the functionality is mostly the same, so it should feel familiar enough for everyone.

New Features

- New snap layouts! We now have several choices of layouts for snapping multiple windows on a monitor instead of the default full and half screen choices. Simply hover over the "maximize" button for these options.
- A new, more intuitive photos application! The photo application is more intuitive, and much more usable than previous versions.
- Virtual desktops! This feature allows you to have multiple workspaces on the same screen. This can be used by selecting the "task view," or by pressing the Windows and Tab keys together.

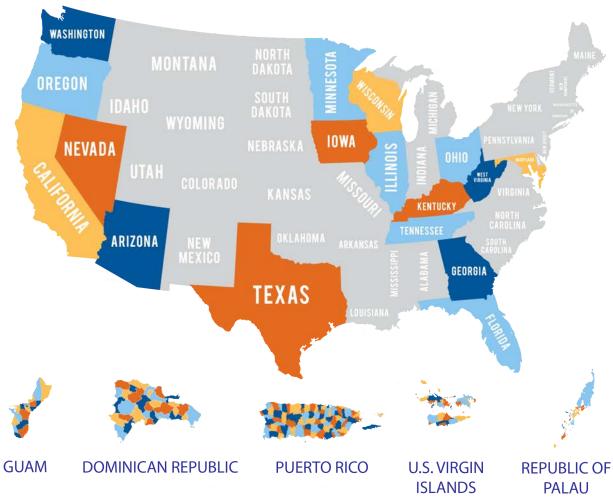

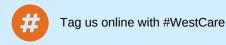
